The course provides a comprehensive review of the accounting cycle and the analytical concepts that underlie the intermediate accounting sequence, and it covers the historical development of current financial reporting, the FASB's conceptual framework, the preparation of the primary financial statements, the measurement, recognition, and reporting of some assets, and the manipulations that can lead to fraudulent financial statements. Students will also study the accounting profession and its role in society and practice the research, spreadsheet, and written and oral communication skills required for a successful career in the profession.</p>	BUS

Gen Ed Goals		
11.1	<p>As part of the functions and responsibilities of the University Curriculum Committee, we are tasked to “make a continuous study of the university curricula as they relate to programs authorized by the Board of Trustees for the Connecticut State University.” (Curriculum Bylaws 3.2), and the Gen Ed Subcommittee has jurisdiction over all aspects of General Educations (Bylaw 5.3). One of the problems we have had in studying the curriculum has been the difficulty in getting good assessment data of the General Education program. One of the difficulties in assessing Gen Ed has been that there are not clearly defined stated goals; instead we have a list of learning outcomes that have been difficult to assess. The learning goals can be found at the bottom of the page here: http://www.ccsu.edu/page.cfm?p=14893</p> <p>I am charging the General Education Subcommittee to work with the University Assessment Committee to review the Gen Ed mission statement and learning outcomes, and develop a set of clear goals of for General Education. Ideally, these goals should be based on the current mission statement for General Education:</p> <p><i>In addition to offering baccalaureate degrees, the University aims to provide students with the basic foundations for life-long learning as rational members of society, to awaken the pleasures of intellectual exploration and to elevate aesthetic sensibilities. This commitment to personal development depends on the acquisition and expansion of knowledge, intellectual processes, and techniques.</i></p>	GenEd
