Motion to approve the amended resolution (Sevitch/Osterreich): passed unanimously The full resolution reads as follows:

Because we value the principle of Academic Freedom as a cherished right of all professors, the fundamental cornerstone in the notion that a university is "a marketplace of ideas", the Faculty Senate of Central Connecticut State University hereby salutes the defense of that principle by our president-elect, Dr. Jack Miller. Despite pressure to deny Professor Ward Churchill a platform at the University of Wisconsin at Whitewater, President Miller did not yield, and courageously defended the right of free speech. We trust that Dr. Miller will continue to be a beacon of academic freedom in his tenure at Central Connecticut State University.
