All items are approved with the exception of B.S. Data Science. This program must be reviewed by the UPBC and approved by the IPC.

Issues are the following:

New Courses--This proposal requires a 30-credit core consisting of the following new courses:

- DATA 101—Fundamentals of Data Science (4)
- DATA 201—Classification Analytics (4)
- DATA 202—Estimation and Clustering Analytics (4)
- DATA 301—Data Science Using Python (4)
- DATA 311—Information Visualization (4)
- DATA 331—Introduction to Multivariate Analytics (4)
- DATA 471—Big Data and Cloud Computing (3)
- DATA 499—Data Science Senior Project (3)

The 6-credit statistics core requires two existing business statistics courses which could serve a new major early on without much impact but would require additional sections if successful.

Seven Concentrations—The proposal lists seven different concentrations with varying numbers of existing courses, courses seldom offered, and new courses.

- Applied Mathematics—1 existing course with good enrollments, 1 existing seldom offered, and 2 new courses.
- Applied Statistics—2 existing courses with room for more students, 3 seldom-offered courses, and 1 new course.
- Biostatistics & Bioinformatics—4 new courses.
- Computation—3 CS courses with strong enrollments each semester and 2 existing course with moderate enrollment once per year.
- Computational Threat Intelligence—The same 3 CS courses with strong enrollments, 2 new Cybersecurity courses.
- Network Threat Intelligence—3 healthy, growing existing courses in CEGT, 2 existing courses with moderate enrollments.
- General Data Science—A mix of courses selected with advisor from the other six concentrations.

Therefore, the proposal both shows promise but also will require investment in the cost of offering new courses and dividing a new set of students among six different sets of concentrations, noting that the seventh concentration consists of courses selected from the other six.

1. Minor Changes

IS 240:

1) Edit the name: from IS 240 Caribbean Cultural Patterns to IS 240 Caribbean Cultures

2) Edit the catalog description to this:

Multi-disciplinary study of the people who inhabit the islands and margins of the Caribbean Sea, with focus on aspects such as history, identity, culture, and artistic and literary productions.

3) Remove the course prerequisite, "Permission of instructor or program coordinator when course is offered in Spanish."

Rationale: The course will not be offered in Spanish. Indication that it could be has been removed in the edit to the catalog description.

2. Announcement: Diversity Committee of the Faculty Senate and the President's Commission on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

Explanation:

The push for increasing diversity in our curriculum has been a process spanning more than a decade. In 2020, it is time to make it a reality where we at CCSU provide an education that is reflective of the student body and community. Students, faculty, and administrators believe we must invest in diversifying our curriculum. While there are many ways to accomplish this, we believe that instituting an EJI-designation (equity, justice, and inclusion-designation) as a graduation requirement is the best way to reach the most students. This course can either be a standalone (new or existing) course, or the focus on EJI can be integrated into an existing course already listed as either a general education course, a course in a major or minor, or an elective. However, the EJI-designation is attached to a specific course, not a section. Therefore, all faculty teaching such a course must commit to the EJI focus.

• Students will not be required to add 3 credits to their program of study if they enroll in an EJI-designated course within general education or their major or minor. In other words, "double dipping" is encouraged.

Description

• An EJI-designated course will use course content, course design (such as variety of methods of instruction, assessment, and assignment type), and classroom interactions to highlight

obstacles to and strategies required to promote equity and social justice and inclusion in the United States.

- An EJI-designated course will integrate equity, social justice, and inclusion into the established course content through course design and heightened attention to classroom interactions and culture.
- An EJI-designated course will explore bias and discrimination in the United States. This can be done through a variety of disciplines in a multitude of ways.

Process

- We have reached out to chairs of all departments on campus requesting courses the department believes meet the EJI description. We have accumulated approximately 55 classes at this point (October 2020) to be reviewed by the Senate Diversity Committee and have attached that list below. Once this proposal is approved, we will collect all syllabi and course descriptions for the final list of EJI-designated courses. These will be listed on the Diversity Committee's website as well as in the SmartCatalog, and Degree Works.
- Moving forward, the Curriculum forms for new course and change course proposals will have an added box to check off for EJI designation. Once checked, the proposal will first get routed to the Diversity Committee of the Faculty Senate. After reviewing the course and syllabus, the proposal will then get sent back to Curriculum to go through the regular Curriculum channels (appropriate subcommittees, main committee, Senate, President).
- Some courses that were initially submitted by faculty as possible candidates for the EJI designation, however, were individual topics courses. Because the EJI designation must be attached to a course and not a section, we cannot request EJI designation for an existing special topics course.
- o However, we strongly encourage departments to submit a new Special Topics course that would have EJI designation attached to it. Then, any faculty member who wanted to try a new course with EJI, could offer that course as a special topics.
