

Accomplishments:

- On March 6th, the committee presented a series of changes to the academic integrity website, syllabus policy, and citation guidance on the usage of artificial intelligence. Suggested changes were accepted by the Faculty Senate and updates are currently in process.
- The committee created several academic integrity/honesty digital signs to be displayed around campus (see samples below). These items were also shared with Marketing to be used on social media. The digital signs are up and running and have received positive feedback from colleagues and students.
- The committee worked with the Office of Students' Rights and Responsibilities to include academic integrity information (see Infographic below) at their booth during student open houses and orientations.
- The committee evaluated the academic misconduct reporting tool to ensure that all key aspects
 of the policy were captured. An opportunity to add guidance around assessing severity of
 misconduct was identified and quickly implemented.
- The committee reviewed other academic integrity websites of institutions around the country to determine if there were gaps in the information presented on CCSU's page. We determined that our content is comprehensive; however, there are always opportunities to enhance the layout. This will be on the agenda for next year.

WHAT IS ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT?

Providing or receiving assistance from sources such as other individuals, websites mobile devices, applications, and artificial intelligence without prior instructor authorization, in the creation of work to be submitted for academic evaluation (including papers, projects and examinations).

Examples include:

Sites such as Chegg and TeachersPayTeachers

Artificial intelligence (AI) tools such as ChatGPT and PhotoMath

"Help" from peers on graded assignments or exams expected to be completed on one's own.



Your professor is aware of all types of misconduct and serious about academic integrity, and has access to many plagiarism and cheating detection tools.

WHAT'S PLAGIARISM AND HOW DO I AVOID IT?

Not providing proper attribution to other sources (including AI tools) through in-text citations, footnotes, and bibliographic references for:

- · Direct quotations
- Condensing an argument
- Paraphrasing another's ideas

WHAT'S CHEATING?

Examples include but are not limited to:

- Submitting work from another person or source
- Helping someone else cheat
- Using notes or books during a closed book exam
- · Sharing exam answers
- Buying or selling papers or exams
- · Writing a paper for another
- Inappropriately collaborating on home assignments or exams

Possible outcomes of academic misconduct include:

- Receiving a zero on an assignment
- Failing a class
- Possible suspension or expulsion from the university
